Delfzijl and Eemshaven - In telling about Jesus we bring Good Tidings aboard the ships

In the midst of all the port activity around me, I stop the car at a quiet spot to pray for the leading of the Holy Spirit. I ask God to lead me to the right ships, to bring people on my path to whom I can speak about Him.

Near the Beatrix pier my path was blocked by two huge cranes, busy at work unloading the cargo ship Ameland. I just couldn't get past them to go to my ship. That's a pity for Ameland stands also for one of my favourite Dutch Islands. Then I drove to the Malt pier where I found the Elandgracht. Also a nice name of course although Eland (Dutch for Moose) didn't rouse any feelings in me.

But what counts is speaking to the shipmates. First there was this conversation with an Ukrainian and a Russian. Both gentlemen confessed to the Faith but the Ukrainian felt more inclined to be a gnostic. I was able to witness to them that God knows about us, personally as individuals and that He longs for us to seek after Him. In spite of their own way of believing, both men gratefully accepted the Interactive Bibles. I also offered them a proper thick woollen hat each. When I asked if they could pass on some literature to other crewmembers, two Philipinos were called. These men told us about their family, wanting to work hard in order for their children to have a good education and have a good life later. We spoke about the power of prayer and that God is always there to help them.

They also received a Bible and literature. The rest of the woollen hats were distributed among their colleagues. A nice bottle ship souvenir will be placed in the galley. We said goodbye in a happy atmosphere and I hope to meet them again in the future.

The most important work we do is encouraging sailors with the message of the Gospel. In telling about Jesus we bring



good news, forgiveness and hope instead of doctrines and strict rules aboard. One sailor in confidence told me he couldn't just understand the Bible: "It is a too difficult book for me". We are privileged to give out Bibles in an easy to understand language like the Interactive Bible. These are full of QR codes pointing to simple explanations through videos etc. I also refer to the website easyenglish.bible. This particular website explains in simple words the complete Bible. All this material and helpful methods is great of

course, but the aim is to bring people closer to their Heavenly Father.

Prayer and intercession is so necessary for our sailor friends. God is good!

Amsterdam - Only Jesus can give real peace

Motionless the big Tanker sits there on the smooth waters. It is now hard to imagine, but barely two days ago this ship was battling the storms in the Gulf of Biscay. The Indian crewmember tells me that the ship was listing up to 40 degrees. The Engineer was even flung against the wall of the mess room, leaving him with a head wound and some badly hurt fingers. When I arrived on-board he had just left the ship to go to the Amsterdam hospital for medical treatment. I have met this Engineer on previous occasions and we get along quite well. We have a good mutual understanding and



shared many a joke. A pity that I missed him but medical treatment is more important. He considers himself to half a Hindu and half a Catholic, a somewhat strange mix but in a land with over 3 million gods, things like that are common. Pray for the Engineer that he will accept Jesus for hundred % as the Way, the Truth and the Life.

I visit a small coaster on a regular basis. On-board is a mixed crew of Albanians, Egyptians and Ukrainians. On deck a sailor is busy sealing the hatches with a hardening foam as an extra safeguard. The journey to England is planned for the evening or night and the forecast is : very bad weather. It is also the topic of the conversation during lunch. The captain is even thinking of sailing the next day. During a recent storm the ship nearly sank in the North Sea and the crew was taken from the ship by a marine helicopter. The captain stayed

aboard and managed to keep the ship on course and all ended well. CS Lewis writes the following about a ship in a storm: 'When we see a ship in a storm we are first of all concerned about the wellbeing of the crew and the cargo. We also worry about the course the ship is sailing, so preventing it to run into another ship or crash into rocks. But the real question one could ask is, why is the ship sailing there, where does it come from and what is its destination'.

The same goes for us for often we are too busy with our problems and responsibilities and we forget that Jesus says: "I am the Bread of Life". During lunch I try to explain this to the crew." Wow, you are a real philosopher!", an Egyptian sailor cries out, but I tell him this is not my thinking but it is all written in the Bible. He receives from me an Arabian Children's Bible. It sounds strange but sailors love reading Children's Bibles.

Then the topic changes for the Egyptian sailor lives next to a place of pilgrimage in Egypt where Joseph and Mary lived with little Jesus when they had to flee for Herod. He tells me about it. Well, how lucky we are that Jesus doesn't need a place where one should worship Him. He is not bound to a place but wants to live inside us, so that we can worship Him from our hearts. Pray for this Egyptian sailor that he will allow Jesus to enter his heart. That evening I noticed that this ship ventured out over the English Channel and all ended well.

One evening Custom Officers pull me aside: wow- a private car, in the Docks in the evening, looks suspicious! But luckily the Bibles are not seen as contraband and both gentlemen wish me luck. The Russian Mate of the ship moored at the Pier finds it rather hilarious and says: "They even bother angels now". I am not an angel but the ships-visitors of the Havenlicht portmission are indeed messengers.

Bad news can be heard worldwide but we are privileged to bring Good News aboard the ships.

It is certainly not fake-news but 100% reliable. Only this Truth can make sailors really free.

Dordrecht - I understand now why God opened this door on the ship

My name is Fabio Jefferson, I come from Brazil. I have had good experiences in my life, mainly as a sailor aboard ships and seeing God's work in my life and in the lives of colleagues. In 2015 when I still lived in Brazil, I prayed to God, asking Him to bless me with a job. I had not been unemployed for long. I wanted to be employed on a Cruise ship. It worked and soon I could work on a ship. The following year when already I had been employed on an Italian MSC Cruise ship, I started evangelising among colleagues with simple words like: "Jesus loves you" and "only He saves". I evangelised among Brazilians as well as Italians, Indonesians, Philipinos, Ukrainians and men from India. One occasion I shall never forget: I was once in the kitchen and suddenly a young Ukrainian came to me. I told him about the Gospel and said: "Jesus loves you" Then he asked: "Does Jesus love me?". "Yes!", I said and continued with



him about Jesus Christ. I noticed that he paid attention to what I was saying. Later he became a good friend of mine. When the Brazilian season ended in April 2016 I went on a ship to Europe. In Invergordon I went to the Church of Scotland. In this church I met several brothers in Christ and was able to take along Bibles and gospel tracts to hand out to my friends aboard the ship. I enjoyed doing this.

When we arrived in Bergen-Norway, I visited the Bergen Seaman's Mission. There I met an English missionary by the name of Paul, who spoke Portuguese. In 2016 I visited Bergen twice and have always taken Bibles with me to give to my colleagues who worked on the ship. Then, in 2017-2018, the ship went to the Mediterranean under a new contract. Then I missed the Seaman's club because at the ports we called in there were none. In 2019 during my last contract, our ship, the MSC Precioza, was to go to Northern Europe. Again I visited the Bergen Seaman's Mission. Like always I took Bibles with me to take to my companions. Because of my contract now expiring, I planned to travel to the Netherlands because of my relation with a Christian Dutch girl. Then, to my joy, he told me about the Mission to Seamen in Holland. If I could work together with them, I must contact Theo van Zuilekom. And so it happened and today I am happy with this great work. I now see and understand why God

opened this door on my last ship in order to help me in the future, also here in Holland.

we passed. By participating in prayer-meetings plus being in contact with fellow missionaries in the ports ,I know what a burden for sailors there is. We have not forgotten them. In the prayer-room of Logos Hope you are confronted with the reality in which the sailors find themselves and their despair. Prayer for them was intense and not without tears.



A book exhibition on land? Helping out in a village? More than two months we were in St. Vincent, one of the least prosperous of the countries in the Caribbean and in the beginning free of Corona. To our regret all had changed before we could go. Many plans didn't work out: no bookstalls to plan and no teaming up with churches etc.

Healed! You need not walk far to meet people here. People are easy to contact, even sharing burdens when joining in prayer and appealing to God for sick family-members. In this way I prayed with someone whose family member was in a critical condition in hospital. "From now on: firmly believe, this is more than a ritual!" A week later I came to inform how things were and Praise God, the one for whom we had prayed so earnestly was present there, healthy and well!

Starting modules for building-projects. "New Style" is the word to find out where a need is locally and then looking for a way of practical help. In this manner we could assist people these last weeks who had needs: a house to build, a school library or helping out with on-line teaching. On-board also a program has been developed to help with

adult language training. In the meanwhile this has been realised.

Our setting , combined with action, creates hope which in turn generates life!

Region IJmuiden - a rucksack with Bibles and literature pressing on your back

Christmas 2020 is already behind us. Our large kitchen is still partly stacked with the Christmas parcels Anneke made for poor sailors. The linen bags contain for instance: a towel, shampoo, toothpaste and a toothbrush, a Sailor Bible and Children's Bible for the family at home and some candy.



Because of Anneke her physical condition, our ship visits fall far short of the ones we made in the past years. We do what we can, the Lord knows about it. To our wonderment present restrictions in Holland, because of the corona crisis, seem to have little effect hindering port mission activities. Still, it remains a rather difficult situation with your facemask on, to climb 60 stairs of a wobbly gangway to later tell your story as to why you want to visit the ship. While mounting the stairs you need to watch your step, balancing between the thickly greased handrail and steel cables of the gangway lifting system, not forgetting that large empty space below between the deck and the ship. All the more, your rucksack with Bibles and literature pressing on your back is also a fact to be reckoned with.

When everything goes well and you finally step on deck, your chest is heaving for air which you need again when you try to speak behind a mask some simple English phrases, enough for Asians to understand! The majority of sailors which we speak to are (a) Philippinos, of which worldwide some 800.000 to 1000.000 have this nationality and (b) The

Chinese. These crews, after greeting them with "Ni Hao" (hallo) and "Jesu Aini" (Jesus loves you) are mostly very open to the Word of God. Philippinos are, on the average, really dear people. They find it amazing that Europeans pay attention to them without asking anything in return. Also, they find it strange that you take the trouble, in spite of weather conditions, and observing how you slowly make your way through a messy and dirty wharf-site grimy with coal dust or iron ore, that you come to see them. When after a visit you offer to pray for them and their family members, they all in surprise say: "OH yes please". Well, continue to pray for us and in particular for Anneke her health.

The First Officer then said:" I hope to see you again". God is at work.


Special prayer points:
